Delegated Legislation

Three examples of delegated legislation ...

1. Orders in Council (What are they - give examples?)
2. Statutory Instruments (What are they - give examples?)
3. Bylaws (What are they - give examples?)

The need for delegated legislation

- Parliament does not have time to pass Acts.
- Lack of technical expertise amongst MPs
- Ministers benefit from further consultation.

Control by Parliament

- Affirmative resolutions
- Negative resolutions
- Scrutiny Committee (set up in 1937).

Control by the Courts

Delegated legislation can be challenged on the ground that it is *ultra vires*.

- R v Home Secretary ex p Fire Brigades Union [1995]
- Strickland v Hayes Borough Council [1896]
- Aylesbury Mushroom case [1972]
- R v Sec of State for Education ex p NUT [2000]

Threat to civil liberties?

- The Home Affairs Select Committee recently discussed how fingerprint legislation in the 1960's resulted in a debate in Parliament and MP's establishing the safeguard of prints being destroyed if not guilty. DNA sample taking went through Parliament as a statutory instrument – result no debate and no such safeguards.
- Can/does Parliament protect our liberties?
